I can say from experience that all our organisations are heavily dependent on volunteers who will at some stage wish to relinquish their roles or find themselves unable to carry on in them. This presents a real challenge for each organisation to develop a succession plan to allow these vital community services to continue. We need to generate the interest and hopefully the enthusiasm for villagers to consider putting themselves forward in the future but the work starts now. I would like to thank on behalf of all our organisations the generosity of our residents in supporting their hard work and dedication.

The Parish Council has continued to represent our community and plays an important role in influencing various Partners in Local Government. There was one significant planning application approved for the Milton House site. There were strong feelings about its unsuitability but we must now maximise the financial benefit that the site brings and the Parish Council will week views at some stage as to how it should be invested. The Council has invested in making the village more interesting by investing in planters that are filled with plants. I may add that requires some voluntary input to maintain their attractiveness. I mentioned last year that it is faced potentially higher levels of energy costs that could threaten its longer term viability. This is now a reality and this will become a real issue over the next eighteen months. This matter is now being addressed by the Parish Council and the Shop Committee. behalf the excellent work done by Kevin and the Shop Committee, Alison, Clare Billy and all the volunteers. Again the plea for volunteers to give a short amount of time has largely gone unheeded let 2024 be different

We are fortunate to have an excellent school that is supported by hardworking staff and governors as well as a community that values their efforts. We should all recognise that it is not without challenges as roll numbers are at present lower that would be desired

Our pub has now become established with Ben and Charmain and we thank them for keeping this prized asset alive and thriving in our community. I am sure the seniors will enjoy their lunch in January.

St James' has a dedicated PCC as well as a number of volunteers who clean the church, decorate the church with flowers and maintain the churchyard and buildings and I thank them for their hard work. The annual village fete will face a new challenge this year as Joyce and George who have hosted the fete for many years are taking a step back. I should like to thank them for all their hard work and commitment for allowing us to use the Old Vicarage for the annual fete. Lindsay Heath and Paul Jeffery are also taking a step back from helping to organise the fete and a big thank you for all their hard work over the years. The annual fete has had a big part in the social fabric of our village since 1984 and I urge the villagers to come forward to ensure that we keep it as an annual event in 2024. The Church is a key cornerstone of our community and I am sure that sentiment is supported by both church and non-church members of our village.

SUMMARY FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL WEDNESDAY 13TH DECEMBER 2023

Below is a summary of some of the topics and discussions which took place at the Parish Council meeting held in December.

Report by District Councillor Georgina Heritage

Cllr Georgina Heritage had circulated her report prior to the meeting. Cllr Heritage reported she had attended several meetings over the last month, sitting on Planning and Licensing Committees. It had been a good month for Neighbourhood Plans, referendums were held for Lewknor, Towersey and Wheatley Plans on 23rd November. All received a majority 'Yes' vote.

South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils are preparing to launch the second round of consultation early next year to develop their new Joint Local Plan

to 2041. Cllr Heritage reported the Chalgrove Airfield housing development site has been deallocated from the Joint Local Plan.

At present SODC cannot demonstrate a 5-year housing land supply (currently 4.2). This is due primarily to the slowness in delivery on the part of developers. SODC continues to defend its policy robustly.

Community Speed Watch

At least seven members of the village have volunteered to help with the Community Speed Watch. Cllr van der Merwe is waiting for the application number to register the group.

Footpaths / Public Right of Way

In May the owner of land at Warren Farm Barn submitted a Highways Declaration which prevents unrecorded rights of way from being legally recorded based on presumed dedication in the future.

Cllr Horwell confirmed there are a number of living witnesses to challenge the footpath has been a Right of Way dating back to 1992. There is enough evidence that the Definitive Map should be changed. The parish council is keen to have established footpaths protected. It was agreed to start the process to add the footpath to the Definitive Map.

Reports from Councillor Representatives

Recreation Ground / Open Spaces

Rainfall over the last few weeks has prevented heavy machinery coming onto the recreation ground to cut the hedge behind the MUGA and playground. The verges were cut on 21st November.

A new bench for Old Fields was delivered to Wayside on 1st December. It was delivered assembled. A means of transporting it to Old Fields is required. It is hoped to resolve the problem before Christmas.

Two lots of bark chippings have been spread along the footpath beside the church. Carol Turner has completely reworked and replanted the three planters, millennium beds and the area around the water pump. These have been planted with seasonal bedding and spring bulbs.

Exchange of Information

The following Planning application was considered under this item, not being formally published on the agenda and a response to Planning Authority being required before the Christmas break.

Repairs and alterations to Grade II* listed dwelling and other buildings within the curtilage. (As amended by plans 002A and 001 A which retain the expression of the original plan form with down stands and corbels received 12 December 2023).

REPORT FROM DISTRICT COUNCILLOR-DECEMBER 2023

Joint Local Plan (and Chalgrove Airfield Deallocation)

South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils are preparing to launch the second round of consultation early next year to develop their new Joint Local Plan to 2041. The Joint Local Plan will help South and Vale determine planning applications, set out how and where new housing developments should take place, set standards for developments such as carbon and energy efficiency requirements, and guide what infrastructure is needed across the districts.

The next public consultation will ask for people's thoughts on proposed approaches across various policy areas, from reducing carbon emissions and nature recovery, to protecting and enhancing local heritage, meeting community infrastructure and transport needs, affordable housing, jobs and economic opportunities, and more. New policy areas which previous local plans haven't covered include policies to protect valued landscapes, tranquil places and dark skies. The councils' proposals include reducing the number of new houses needed each year, improving minimum standards for water and energy efficiency, increasing biodiversity and the number of affordable houses developments need to deliver.

The next consultation is scheduled to launch to the public in January 2024, subject to review by both councils' cabinets, however you can view documents relating to the plan which were subject to Scrutiny in November: https://democratic.southoxon.gov.uk/ieListDocuments.aspx?CId=341&MId=3240

SODC/Vale propose to deallocate Chalgrove Airfield as a strategic site and the following is an extract of the information summitted to the Scrutiny Committee Currently Allocated Sites Proposed Not to be Retained in the Joint Local Plan There are three currently allocated sites, with standalone policies, that have not been granted planning permission which we are not proposing to retain.

Land at Chalgrove Airfield What status will this site have in the Joint Local Plan? We do not propose to retain this site allocation (currently allocated under Policy STRAT7 of the South Oxfordshire Local Plan 2035) in the Joint Local Plan. What has changed from our previous plan? Our review of existing allocated sites has demonstrated that the allocated development is unlikely to be achievable, and that this site is no longer suitable for development. Achievability concerns. The site promoter (Homes England) has identified issues with complying with the existing policy for the currently allocated site. An objection from the Civil Aviation Authority (CCA) regarding the proposed layout of the runway led to Homes England withdrawing its outline planning application for this site in May 2021.

The current allocation of 3,000 homes is not achievable within the existing allocated site boundary. The site is leased by Killinchy Aerospace Holdings Limited (until 2063). Killinchy's operating subsidiary Martin Baker Aircraft Company Ltd develops and tests ejector seats for armed forces around the globe. The current site boundary does not allow enough space for 3,000 new homes and a realigned runway delivered to Civil Aviation Authority standards. Homes England has advised that the site boundary would need to be extended (predominantly to the north into currently unallocated, Greenfield land) to address the CAA's concerns about the runway. Suitability concerns our review has found that the significant change in social and environmental priorities of the Joint Local Plan now render the site unsuitable for development. The Chalgrove Airfield site is not a good fit with the emerging spatial strategy for the Joint Local Plan (see Policy SP1), which involves delivering planned development within Science Vale, focusing new housing at the garden communities of Didcot, Berinsfield and Dalton Barracks, on well-located brownfield sites, and maintaining existing sites that contribute to addressing Oxford's unmet housing need. An extension to the site boundary to include

additional land in the control of the site promoter to facilitate a relocation of the runway, to address the CAA concerns, would result in the site's Greenfield footprint extending even further. It would further diminish the extent to which this is a brownfield site since it would involve building on Greenfield land. The Joint Local Plan's strategy is to support development on well-located brownfield land. Therefore, whilst Homes England do control the land to facilitate an extension, expanding the allocation would result in the site further conflicting with the emerging spatial strategy of the Joint Local Plan. We therefore do not consider that the policy in its current or an amended form is capable of addressing the issues of achievability or suitability identified above. Given that the suite of other existing allocations already provides sufficient housing to meet South Oxfordshire's housing requirement (see Policies HOU1 and HOU2), this site is not needed to address our housing needs.

RECTOR'S PINT

For my piece this month, I mainly want to offer a brief tribute to my predecessor in these parishes, Rev. Victor Story.

Victor was the Rector here for fifteen years, more than enough time to get his feet under the table! I only met him a few times, when he returned here to assist with funerals, to give the eulogy or lead the prayers for people he had known well. I was always impressed by his attention to detail, and his warmth and love for those he was remembering.

Victor was a gentle man, and I know that he was a man of prayer. As a qualified teacher, he maintained a love for the schools, and I know that he was also well loved by them. His funeral took place on 14th December at St. Mary's and it was well attended by many of his friends from the various parishes he had served in.

Victor had no family of his own. He was married for a few years in the 1990's, a time that brought him great joy. Tragically, his wife died, and I know that Victor carried the grief of that for the rest of his life.

Of course there was sadness at his funeral, but there was also much joy and thanksgiving, as we heard about his ministry here and elsewhere, including his life in Chipping Norton following his retirement, and what he meant to Matilda, the granddaughter of Vera who used to clean the Rectory. Victor had appointed Matilda as his executor without her knowledge, but she did a magnificent job of pulling the funeral together. My thanks to Tim Suter and Kate Billimore and the choir for organising the music in such a short time - with Carol Services looming only three days later. The Nunc Dimittis at the end of the funeral was particularly beautiful. So many have commented that the whole service was 'just so Victor!'

It is hoped that Victor's ashes will be interred in the grave of his beloved wife in Evesham, where Victor served as curate between 1981 and 1985.

I would also like to send my best wishes for the New Year to all readers of the 'Pint'. We have all experienced a bumpy ride for several years now, and we can only look out with increased sadness at the news we see unfolding in parts of our world. It adds some urgency to the beginning of the Lord's Prayer every time we use it: 'Thy kingdom come, thy will be done....' In our own small way though, each of us has a responsibility to be an answer to that prayer.

As St Paul wrote in his letter to the Hebrews: (Chapter 11 Verse 1)

FRIENDS OF WELLS FARM

As 2023 comes to a close I thought I would reflect on all the good work that has been done to maintain and improve Wells Farm by so many people. Land needs management

and careful planning to make sure the habitat is right for wildlife to thrive. At the beginning of the year some hedge maintenance was carried out. If a hedge grows too tall it will eventually collapse. New hedgerow plants were dug in along the west edge of Long Meadow. The paths were cut when the vegetation threatened to take over. The field fence posts were checked and many replaced. Bramble and willow was cleared from the paths. Nettles, thistles and ragwort removed. So much of this was done by volunteers from the midweek team or the new village work party. Wells is a working farm and there are two key elements to this. The farm is used to home sheep and Dexter cattle, the best grass cutting machines! These are watched over by our wonderful shepherds, our stock watch team of volunteers who check that none of the flock are missing, limping or ill, sometimes having to feed them hay in the colder weather. We said farewell to one of them - Paul Harrison, who enjoyed caring for the animals and occasionally wielding a scythe to keep the grass in the orchard down! There are several fields farmed on a rotation basis which provides perfect habitat for several bird species such as the grey partridge, skylarks and corn buntings. For many years, Guy and his son Paul, having the neighbouring land, farmed 4 fields in such a wildlife sympathetic way, often stopping their tractors to chat to watch the hares run around the fields or chat to passers-by. Sadly they both passed away this year and we lost both of them. Especially the whiskey in one of the pubs at the end of the evening! So what will 2024 bring? The birds, mammals and insects have seen many changes, but carry on their struggle to survive. Some will find the weather changes more challenging, while others may thrive. It is up to us to help look after this little oasis next to our village, do our bit to help nature survive and above all, enjoy it!

I plan to run a work party on Saturday January 6th from 10am till 1pm. The plan is to thin out some alder and poplar running along the Gainsbridge brook in Long meadow. You are very welcome to join in.

Lastly, there is a project to re-introduce water voles to the river Thame and the various brooks that feed it such as the Haseley brook and the Gainsbridge brook. This is being funded by Natural England and driven locally by BBOWT and the River Thame Conservation Trust. If you want to know more or get involved check out www.riverthame.org.

VIEW FROM VIEWS

Well, what do you know! We have a new Environment Minister, the tenth in as many years. It is hard to understand how, anyone can come into and run or decide policy, on a complicated industry as agriculture and, make any worthwhile contributions in such a short time, in an industry that is basically long term. This sort of disregard for the largest industry in the country is very unsettling for those of us involved, and making long term decisions extremely difficult.

I get the impression that there are many more Field Fares than normal this year. I am told this is because we have more berries than other places, this is good news as it also shows we are having some effect on nature. Rooks are having a field day where our crops have suffered badly from Slugs and Flea Beetle, presumably on these pests many other grubs, you can see areas where they have been poking around with their beaks searching for food. Also as and when, which is not very often this year, the floods recede, Egrets have taken up residence again but, no ducks this time, swans as well are enjoying what we provide. It is good to see the odd Kestrel about, we used to see them

quite regularly but not of late, although siting is not necessarily on our farm but, in the locality which is reassuring, let's hope they are on the rebound. L thought I saw, what I thought to be a Buzzard, it was Buzzard shape but very pale in colour, on looking it up I discovered there is a rare Buzzard called a pale Buzzard only saw it once.

The Farm Cluster I mentioned some time ago that we formed to enhance the environment around the river Thame, have just been awarded a large sum of government money for our proposals for projects along the river catchment, this is very exciting allowing us to increase wildlife friendly initiatives. Now the hard work of planning and putting things into practice will be exercising our capabilities somewhat in the coming years, luckily we have our hard working facilitator, aided and abetted by the "River Thame Conservation Trust". All very exciting however when the PM suddenly announces the relaxation laws on things like nutrient neutrality which, I think is a "bl....y"! cheek whilst we farmers and, many Conservation Trusts and, like-minded bodies, have been doing the best they can to mitigate the impact we have on the environment. Just so that we can build more houses and spoil even more countryside, I still have to ask myself if in reality the general public actually care, or know what we are trying to do. When you see the carnage caused by the development to the west of Chalgrove, total disregard for soil, not to mention "HS2", it nearly breaks my heart every time I see these massive excavators mindlessly tearing up the soil.

It will not have escaped anyone's notice that we have had rather a lot of rain just lately, I read some interesting figures with reference to rain fall. 2inches (50mm) of rain equates to 200tonnes per acre (640 acres to square mile) I think this illustrates the amount of weight the land has to stand at times of flood. Most of this Autumn/Winter we have some 15 acres underwater, this equates to 3,000 tonnes on our little patch of England no wonder the meadows are sinking!

For the first time, I believe, we have decided that about 1/3 of our autumn planted crop will have to destroyed and replanted, just because of the weather, which has not only caused saturation of the land encouraging things like slugs. It is not that it has been that wet but that it has never had the chance to dry out. An interesting fact that an old college friend reminded me of, that Wheat, the only crop we have that has survived the rigours of this wet weather, will only stand being water logged for 24 hours. In the patches where the water is standing, there is no plant at all, I had either forgotten that fact or was asleep in the lecture when it was mentioned. Now we have to decide what to plant in the spring this looks likely to be ½ & ½ Lupins again and Poppies for seed. Both of these crops will produce flowers which will be nice and please the bees.

Now following a very biased BBC programme on, how bad beef is for the planet, we have to try and get the truth out to the public just because an idiot was allowed to say all beef was bad for climate, without making any mention of the fact that they actually help carbon sequestration by recycling it back into the soil as most cattle in the UK are grass fed. No mention either was made of the fact that the gas they emit is methane, which is degraded in the atmosphere over time, what happened years ago when the plans of North America were teeming with Bison and Buffalo, did they not emit Methane? The programme also made mention that we should be eating more chicken, not mentioning that they are one of the biggest users of Soya which, is largely grown in South America where the rain forests have been cleared for its cultivation.

The growing year does not follow the calendar, and while the winter may be mostly dormant December is a time for cabbages, parsnips and of course sprouts! A good time to reflect on what has worked and what to change for next year. Mother Nature seems to always do well, but the battle against the weeds (or native plants) comes to a close. It has been such a mild winter though, and a wet year so I wonder whether we need to adjust what we grow? Of course 2024 could be a dry one, so always best to hedge your bets. In January or early Feb some hedge maintenance is required which will yield hazel sticks for beans. There are a few plots available and a couple of people joining next year. If you are interested and have time to grow your own, drop me a message. Happy New Year.
