I am often told by new and established residents that our village is a great place to live as they enjoy the tranquillity of a rural community and the efforts of volunteers who make our local organisations appear to work so smoothly. I have highlighted this regularly in my editorial the challenge for each organisation to develop a succession plan to allow these vital community services to continue. This is a message that needs to be stated every year. We need to generate the interest and hopefully the enthusiasm for villagers to consider putting themselves forward in the future but the work starts now. I would like to thank on behalf of all our organisations the generosity of our residents in supporting their hard work and dedication.

The Parish Council has continued to represent our community and plays an important role in influencing various Partners in Local Government. The recent planning application on the Haseley Trading Estate for a refuse lorry depot generated a considerable level of opposition that the Parish Council represented on our behalf. . Sadly, the outcome was not what we would have liked.

The A329 has taken up Parish Council time since the mid 1970's when it was upgraded from a B road. This change brought in its wake a significant increase in traffic and HGV's We appreciate the efforts that the current Council has made to persuade OCC to have a weight limit on the road. I need to comment on the enforcement of the speed limit particularly since the 20 mph was introduced in 2024. A recent incident of two vehicles legally parked on Church Hill/ Stadhampton road highlighted the strong concerns in the village that this action had for safety and environmental matters whilst the action was supported as it addressed the real or perceived issue of speeding. It could have been on Thame Road, High Street or Haseley Road. The positive outcome is that the Parish Council will address the concerns and bring forward an action plan. My message would be to use the designated channels to pursue concerns and not take actions that could cause disharmony in our community. The current term of office for the Parish Council will end in April 2027 and there will be the election of a new Council in May 2027. This an opportunity for you to serve your community. I plant the seed! I would like to thank the Council on your behalf for the all the work they do.

The Village Hall committee provide an excellent facility that is hired out for regular and one-off hire. They also provide social events for our community of which the fireworks night is must attend event. . The Committee perform an excellent job but will always welcome new committee members or as supporters of particular events e.g. Quiz Nights Make a point this year of coming to the Annual General Meeting to visibly offer your support. A big thank you to the committee for maintaining this vital village asset.

Our Village Shop and Post Office are a very important amenity and one that has gone from strength to strength. The shop has benefitted from the installation of solar panels after securing grant funding. It will get a further boost when the expensive energy contract comes to an end in January 2026

Our Shop/Post Office is a vital community asset that we need to do all we can to ensure its long-term survival. This will depend upon being able to broaden the support of volunteers both for those working in the shop and the work done by those outside the shop. Perhaps this is something that you could offer and I urge you to contact Kevin Hunt. We welcome Clare as shop manager/postmistress and thank Alison for her dedicated service as shop manager/postmistress for fifteen years. This leads me into thanking on your behalf the excellent work done by Kevin and the Shop Committee, Julie, Clare and all the volunteers.

We are fortunate to have an excellent school that is supported by Sarah and her hardworking staff and governors as well as a community that values their efforts.

Our pub has now become established with Ben and Charmain and we thank them for keeping this prized asset alive and thriving in our community

St James' has a dedicated PCC as well as a number of volunteers who clean the church, decorate the church with flowers, maintain the churchyard, and a special word for Geoff Quaiermain for his contribution in the churchyard. I thank them for their hard work. St James' will have a new Rector in 2026 as Simon has retired after ten years.

The Church is a key cornerstone of our community and I am sure that sentiment is supported by both church and non- church members of our village.

The publication and distribution of our Newsletter is something that happens each month and I am sure that the Village would like to say thank you to all who are involved. I am pleased to say that MP Printers in Thame provide an excellent service and my thanks to the distributors who diligently deliver a newsletter to each house. As editor I appreciate the excellent photographs that I receive from some of the village photographers and most importantly to all the correspondents who submit their articles each month.

SUMMARY OF PARISH COUNCILMEETING ON WEDNESDAY 10th DECEMBER 2025

Below is a summary of some of the planning discussions that took place at the Parish Council meeting held in December.

Several residents attended the Parish Meeting and spoke during the Public Forum to express their anger and concern related to two vehicles parked on the A329. Below is an extract from the draft minutes related to the item.

A329 – Parked Vehicles

Several representations from residents had been received regarding two vehicles on the A329 that had been parked there for several weeks. Cllr van der Merwe has spoken to the owner of the vehicles in a personal capacity to try and gain a better understanding

of why the vehicles had been parked on the road. This afternoon the vehicles were removed by the police.

District Councillor Heritage supported gathering vehicle data via a traffic 'survey and will pass on a request to County Councillor Judith Edwards to ask ``the County team to contact the Parish Council.

It was agreed to progress the installation of a Speed Indicator Device on Church Hill (A329) as soon as possible. It was noted that Cllr Sheppard is due to meet with a member of the County Highways team next week to agree the exact location of the device.

Resolved that a traffic survey covering all areas of the village is undertaken as soon as possible. Data from the survey will be collected and used to inform future decision making. The survey data will be communicated to residents through the village newsletter and electronically.

{Post meeting note: The owner of the vehicles submitted the following statement to the Parish Council on Tuesday 16 December - 'Two vehicles were parked lawfully on the road while works at my property were underway. Thames Valley Police officers confirmed the vehicles were legally parked before removal. Any traffic calming effect was incidental.'}

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on **Wednesday 14th January 2026** in Pine Lodge, commencing at 7.30pm.

SODC: WASTE MANAGEMENT CONTRACT

The minimum charge is £53.50 for up to 3 items and £10.25 for each additional item. There is a maximum of six items per collection day: if you have more than six, you'll need to book another collection day. Please note that a bed and mattress count as 2 items and a three-piece suite (consisting of 1 settee and 2 chairs) counts as 3 items.

Before you contact us to book your bulky waste collection, have a good think about whether you have any other big items to dispose of. Once we have processed your booking, we are unable to make any alterations or add any other items – even if you have only booked one or two items.

UPPATE FROM DISTRICT COUNCILLOR – GEORGINA HERITAGE

Joint Local Plan

We have an important update on our Joint Local Plan (JLP)... The Joint Local Plan is at the examination stage, and some recent correspondence from our Joint Local Plan Inspectors provides welcome news.

Planning Minister Matthew Pennycook has issued a [ministerial statement](#) confirming that the Government is intending to remove the duty to co-operate as a requirement in the planning system through new planning regulations to be laid early in the new year. In a letter to the Planning Inspectorate, the Minister then asked Inspectors of plans currently at examination (like our JLP) to begin any necessary dialogue with councils in advance of the Regulations coming into effect.

The JLP Inspectors have therefore written to us at South and Vale seeking our views on the implications and in particular how we wish to proceed. You can read the letter [here](#). 9 Oct 2025	<p>The Minister for Planning and Housing, Matthew Pennycook, <u>wrote</u> to the PINS' Chief Executive, Paul Merton - urging the Planning Inspectorate (PINS) to adopt an “appropriate degree of flexibility” during examinations.</p> <p>He wrote “the final set of local plans being delivered within the current system remain essential to facilitating the effective delivery of housing, jobs and infrastructure. It is therefore critical that Inspectors approach examinations of current system plan with the appropriate degree of flexibility. The evidencing of expectations to establish whether the legal and soundness tests have been met – including with respect to the Duty to Cooperate – should be proportionate to the context in which plans in the existing system are being prepared.”</p>
20 Oct 2025	The Councils wrote to the Inspectors again, asking them to reconsider their initial conclusions (examination library reference: <u>LPA40</u>)
31 Oct 2025	The Inspectors acknowledged receipt of the Councils' 20 October letter. They confirmed they will consider the Ministerial letter and the views expressed by the Councils in the letter. They also confirmed that they will provide a more substantive response in due course. (examination library reference: <u>ID11</u>)
27 Nov 2025	<p>The Minister for Planning and Housing, Matthew Pennycook, released a <u>Written Ministerial Statement</u> (WMS), stating: "...to help drive local plans to adoption as quickly as possible and progress towards our objective of universal local plan coverage, we have decided not to ‘save’ the Duty, thereby removing this requirement for plans in the current system."</p> <p>The Minister for Planning and Housing, Matthew Pennycook, <u>wrote</u> to the Chief Executive of the Planning Inspectorate, Paul Merton - regarding the update to the Duty to Cooperate.</p> <p>He wrote “The Duty will therefore cease to apply when the Regulations come into force early next year, including for plans at examination at that point. On the basis of the government’s firm intention to abolish the Duty for the current system, examining Inspectors may wish to begin any necessary dialogue with LPAs in advance of the Regulations coming into effect, with reference to this letter. Of course, LPAs should continue to collaborate across their boundaries, including on unmet development needs from neighbouring areas and Inspectors should continue to examine plans in line with the policies in the NPPF on ‘maintaining effective co-operation’.”</p>
28 Nov 2025	Joint Local Plan Inspectors sent a letter to the Councils (examination library reference: <u>ID12</u>) seeking our views on the implications of the WMS and the Minister’s letter for the Examination and in particular how we wish to proceed.

Five out of seven councils back the two-unitary proposal for council reorganisation

A consensus emerged for the shape of Local Government Reorganisation in the area after five councils in Oxfordshire and West Berkshire formally supported a proposal for two new, innovative, and locally accountable unitary authorities, aimed at addressing current inefficiencies, enhancing services, and saving millions in response to the government's call for reform of council structures.

After reviewing all three proposals for Oxfordshire and West Berkshire, the majority of councils in the area have agreed that the two-unitary option offers the best outcomes for local residents when a decision is made by government next year.

As the councils discussed the options, the key areas were:

- **Delivering better services:** The proposal responds to what residents have said needs improving, from highways and social care to planning.
- **The best financial outcomes:** Delivers the greatest potential savings (£59.8m annually) and lowest financial risk of all three proposals, helping to protect key services and ensure long-term stability across Oxfordshire and West Berkshire.
- **Boosting both rural and urban economies:** Drives sustainable growth across Oxford, market towns and rural areas, creating more jobs, better transport and the right homes in the right places.
- **Creates councils responsive to their communities:** Keeps councils close to all local communities and tailored to their specific needs, ensuring strong local accountability and representation.

Forming two unitary councils has the potential to save the most money of all the proposals for the area (based on shared PwC modelling) and, at the same time, creates authorities that are big enough to be efficient, stable, and reliable, but small enough to care for and be responsive to communities.

The Councils also raised concerns about the other proposals.

For the single-unitary proposal, they expressed concerns that it was too large, would be far too distant from communities and did not show the ambition local communities and businesses deserved.

For the three-unitary proposal, they expressed concerns that it would not create financially sustainable councils, did not meet the government criteria, and would negatively impact Oxford and the green belt.

The proposal was submitted to the government by the 28 November deadline, and it is anticipated that the government will consult on all proposals for the area in spring 2026 before deciding later in the summer. The government's preferred model is scheduled to become fully operational in 2028.

Residents can read the full proposal or a shortened version on the website www.twocouncils.org. The proposal covers all the key points, including how services will be run, financial modelling, implementation plans, and the vision for the future.

Over £700,000 of funding approved for new community and youth centre in Thame

£779,246 of funding has been approved as a contribution towards the building of a new Community and Youth Centre at Southern Road Recreation Ground in Thame. Thame

Town Council will receive funding from SODC to create a modern, welcoming facility for residents to enjoy, helping improve emotional and mental wellbeing.

With the funding agreed, Thame Town Council can now move forwards with plans to demolish the disused changing block and build a new community and youth centre. The new facility will provide young people with a safe space for their own use with support from youth workers, and where people of all ages can organise and join activities, and meet others.

The building will include flexible and rentable spaces including a new 200-capacity community hall for events, lectures, conferences, health and wellbeing, fitness and arts activities, a music room, kitchen, and a dedicated youth club, and small group and one to one consultation space. It will also offer EV charging, bike racks, and improved access to green space. There will be a refreshed play area, accessible toilets with baby-changing facilities, seating, and an income-generating kiosk.

The project will provide a permanent home for the Thame Youth Project Group and will help reduce anti-social behaviour in the area, improve wellbeing, and offer new opportunities and skills for local people in the community

The new funding for the project comes from Section 106 – this is the funding the council collects from housing developers to support the growth of the district when new developments are built.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Mind the gap!

I suspect we are all rather tired of being constantly reminded to “mind the gap between the train and the platform”. As a young boy I used to enjoy looking down through the gap, to see the rails and the wheels, and especially the couplings between carriages, while always of course being careful. And “mind” can mean much more than simply “beware of”. It really means “remember”, “pay attention to”, “look at and think carefully about”, and has overtones of care, applying oneself, and so on. “Minding the gap” can be a positive experience.

We may all be aware of gaps in our lives this January. Some can be addressed easily enough: lack of exercise, for instance, by making a resolution to take more. A financial gap may in some cases be eased by more prudent budgeting, or by an extra income-producing activity, or by a change of tack. I am told that some of those laid off by *Le Manoir* at this time are taking the opportunity to start a course or a new job. For those who are really struggling to make ends meet, we may be able to help close the gap ourselves by supporting the Thame Food Bank, as we try to do by our monthly collections.

Some gaps may be very painful, for instance those left by the loss of a loved one, whether human or animal. These can never be filled to the extent of removing the deep sense of loss, but friends and family can at least help by being there and offering practical and emotional support. If we know someone who has been bereaved, let’s weep with them and smile with them, hug them, and never avert our eyes or cross the road to avoid meeting them.

The season of Advent (before Christmas) reminded us that the painful centuries-long gap of God’s apparent absence from his people’s lives was coming to an end. The promise of “Emmanuel, God with us” was and is a very powerful encouragement. When Jesus came to fulfil that promise it was like a honeymoon period for those who lived closely with him. When he left them, first in death and then a few weeks later in the Ascension, they were devastated. How would the gap in their lives ever be filled again?

But Jesus promised: “I will not leave you comfortless (literally: orphans), I will come to you.” He sent his Holy Spirit to make his presence real to us. He longs to fill the “God-shaped gap” that the seventeenth-century scientist and writer Blaise Pascal

identified in the human heart. Christians down the ages have found that he does just that.

If the Holy Spirit can fill that most fundamental gap, he can help to fill other gaps in your life. Have you tried praying about them? In our family, if someone loses something and can't find it, one of the others will ask: "Have you prayed about it?"

Well, have you? Happy New Year!

FRIENDS OF WELLS FARM

Happy New Year to you all. January brings new beginnings and glimpse of Spring. Last year's bumper berry hedgerows will have provided many birds with plenty of food for the winter, but for seed eater, wild food is now running low. Now is the time when they need you the most. If you have feeders, make sure you clean them out and put enough food to satisfy the needs of the goldfinches, greenfinches and many other birds. Any old apples can go out for the blackbirds too. You might even get a little bank vole appear on your feeder if they can get to it. Bank voles are harmless rodents that live in hedgerows or dry-stone walls and are a bit like a mini "Ratty" from "Wind in the Willows", which was actually a water vole.

Last winter on the reserve we recorded a record 65 harvest mouse nests around the two Cremar fields and along a hedgerow bordering Long Meadow. I believe the significant increase in nests was partly due to the fields being unfarmed, the edges left unmanaged and a wetter year, meaning good grass growth. This year is a very different story. With the government's abrupt halt to the SFI grant applications, four Wells Farm fields had to be returned to arable and a tenant farmer was found. Sadly, the field edges where many of the nests were, was cleared more than instructed and this year's survey showed no nests whatsoever. The colony in that area may have been wiped out. Luckily, there was a good patch of rough field edge at the end of the reserve by the ditch bordering Linz field, and we have recorded 14 nests so far in a small patch. Nature will try and survive if given somewhere to do so. I am running another survey in January so if you want to find out more, just contact me.

We hear in the news of people complaining about the destruction of Amazon or Asian rainforests, but virtually nothing is reported closer to home. Our government has slashed funding for conservation, halting grants, significantly reducing money to fund Natural England, removing protection for bats and other wildlife by relaxing the need for surveys on new builds and extensions. I have now heard rumour that they are going to stop Biodiversity Net Gain grants for small sites. This has affected BBOWT, and many other wildlife trusts significantly, leading to loss of jobs and less people able to conserve what we have left. I understand that being a member of organisations such as BBOWT is ever more important, so if you use Wells Farm regularly, enjoy seeing it from your garden or want to make a local difference, please become a member or renew your existing one. Our Wildlife needs you!

Thames Water have recently been on site, albeit initially treating one of the fields as a quadbike race track! They were allowed on site to seal the pipe that runs from the Haseleys to our pumping station. The idea is to stop water ingress causing an overload of the pipe, although I personally struggle to see this working. I wonder where the waste water from the council refuse vehicle cleaning will go?

A while back, BBOWT were awarded £20,000 to carry out some flood mitigation on the reserve, but have discovered they also need planning permission which is why nothing has yet happened. Give with one hand and take with the other, I guess.

However, there is a good chance some work can be done early in the New Year without such challenges. Will keep you posted.

I am starting up the work parties again this year. If you want to get involved, please drop me a message. You can make a real difference by just spending a few hours helping to keep the paths clear, remove vegetation, repair gates and stiles plus lots more. Email below.

Finally, there is vehicular access to the site, with Thames Water completing their repairs to the pipe, although they have done a poor job of the gate. One of the posts has sagged so the gate rests on the floor. I am not holding out much hope on TW fixing it yet but will try and get through to them.

It is a good time to start planning your plots. What to grow, where to grow it. Maybe some initial ground preparation and the addition of composted material. Spreading leaves on top and covering will encourage the worms to take them underground and help you enrich the soil. Not long until the ground warms up and the planting season commences!

Thank you, Graham, for doing a repair on the leaky well head pump. I have also asked BBOWT for wood so the ramp to the shed can be repaired. Some bramble clearance is required, which will probably involve a brush cutter rather than a tractor. I also plan to do some more hedge maintenance which should provide bean sticks for anyone who wants them. I will arrange a catch-up meeting in a couple of months. We do have some vacant plots if anybody wishes to take one on and is prepared to do a bit of work getting them into shape. Just contact me and I can show you around.

VIEW FROM VIEWS

Now we start a new year, what will it bring for us, I am no soothsayer so will leave it at that. One thing I do know, at the time of writing (last year), that I have been alluding to the fact that we had had a kind autumn and how well all the Autumn planted crops were looking, that is except some 100 acres of wheat. What happened to the Wheat is that, being ultra efficient and forward thinking, with the conditions being so favourable we got on and sprayed the pre(crop) emergence weed killer, before the weather changed. As it happened, we had a downpour this being a soil acting chemical, was washed straight through the soil and, affected the germinating crop, so now we have a very uneven looking piece of Wheat, very disheartening when all other crops look so good for a change.

Some interesting wildlife sightings on Views Farm, (at night with night vision), a Peregrine Falcon, many hares that we don't see in the daylight, most extraordinary an Otter in a field at least a kilometre from the river, also a Chinese water deer. We think our efforts to clear the river of Mink has had some effect, as water vole have been sighted along the river.

In November last year there was a movement within some more forward-thinking MPs, that we should have a land use survey, being worried that we are hell bent on using productive agricultural land for solar panels, wind farms, energy crops, building, roads, reservoirs, to name but a few. Giving no thought to the question of the real possibility that we may need to produce our own food to survive in the not-too-distant future, come global conflict, which is looking more and more likely by the day. At the moment this alternative use of land is not a problem, if we just consider cereals to be honest, we have probably a surplus, we could/should be growing more pulses to save importing Soya grown where rain forests used to be. The problem with that statement is that we cannot produce these at a competitive price as the rest of the world, due to the fact our overheads are far higher than others.

The big problem with growing our own crops also is the harvesting, when we consider Fruits and vegetables, without foreign labour. It is difficult to understand why our own nationals don't seem to be able or willing to do this manual work. Having said that there

are many reasons for this, one that the work is very seasonal and what will they do when not needed, who will pay them when they are not needed for work, also there may not be enough workers in the locality which will create a travel issue. We do have to accept that we will have to get used to doing more menial tasks ourselves. With our current knowledge it would not be beyond possibility to be self-sufficient in most staples but, we need to be confident that we can get the Labour, at a price that the end product can stand, plus the financial confidence that the government will not plunder our efforts. We also need less unnecessary regulation, putting us at a disadvantage to our competitors.

“Kidlington Rubbish”, some agency’s eyes must have been shut, we now will have to pay for this why? I cannot believe that as this was first reported in September why it was not stopped until mid-November, someone was not on the ball, it was no good putting up a notice saying stop and, not following it up. There is the issue of 1000 dead fish in Roke marsh lake, honestly what is going wrong in our society, no one seems to care. Now we have just learned, via an enquiry made by our MP, through the freedom of information act, that “Homes England” have already spent some £25.5m on research into the development of Chalgrove Airfield, without consulting Martin Baker, who have said they are not able/willing to move. Plus, an additional £11m on land purchase, I think this all allows us to be critical of the powers that be.

All the above just illustrates how our hard-earned wages are just wasted this is without mentioning HS2, welfare paying people who are better off on the dole, and allowing pressure groups to influence Government decisions on trivial issues that will hold up development unnecessarily. It is these smaller issues that costs a lot to circumnavigate making infrastructure projects delayed and over budget. Some of the so-called red tape is due to public pressure, so you could say it is our fault.

One bit of good news is that the appeal into the development of a transport Hub and science park at Waterstock, has been refused by the inspector, something I think none of us thought likely, so sometimes our representations do work for the public good. I doubt it though it will not be too long before something else rears its ugly head for us to lose a bit more to Nature.
