SUMMARY FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL WEDNESDAY 13th MARCH 2024

Below is a summary of some of the topics and discussions which took place at the Parish Council meeting held in March.

Planning

P24/S0570/LB - Plum Tree Cottage, High Street, Little Milton, OX44 7PU Replace windows to the cottage and garage. **Resolved to Fully Support** the application.

P24/S0636/LB - Pear Tree Cottage, Haseley Road, Little Milton, OX44 7QE Installation of 11 solar panels onto the rear south facing roof. **Resolved to Fully Support** the application.

Little Milton Village Shop

The financial forecast presented in January is on track. It is not anticipated that financial support for the shop will be required for the next 2 to 2.5 years. Electricity usage has been cut back. There is a need for volunteers to step forward to help support running the shop.

Speed Indicator Device Signage (SIDs)

Three possible locations have been identified. Agreed to prioritise the location nearest the school. Updated quotations to be obtained and a formal application made to County Councillor van Mierlo for $\pounds 1,500$ from his Councillor Grant Fund towards the cost of a SID.

Reports from Councillor Representatives

Recreation Ground and Open Green Spaces

A further planter to be placed on the corner of Haseley Road and the A329 will be ordered in the next couple of months. As agreed at the last meeting a water carrier at a cost of £280 will be ordered in May.

The Parish Council will continue to pursue the Senior Officer for Cyclical Works at Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) to push for the drains in the village to be cleared. Biffa has agreed to clear the build-up of material on part of the pavement along the A329.

Contact has been made with the OCC Senior Bridge Technician who has agreed to schedule work to repair the bridge parapet. This will take time due to OCCs winter damage workload.

Highways

The Parish Council has made three separate reports via Fix My Street for repairs to the highway beside the brook. It was agreed to write to landowners adjacent to the brook asking them to carry out their responsibilities as riparian landowners to help alleviate flooding.

The missing signage and lighting from the chicane at the entrance to the village from Thame will be reported again using the new Highways Team Engagement email.

Thames Water trucks have been busy at the pumping station during recent periods of heavy rainfall. Thames Water has reported a further effluent release into the brook. It was agreed to publicise this via social media to alert people and their pets not to go near the brook

SODC: WASTE MANAGEMENT CONTRACT

The minimum charge is $\pounds 49.50$ for up to 3 items and $\pounds 9.50$ for each additional item. There is a maximum of six items per collection day: if you have more than six, you'll need to book another collection day. Please note that a bed and mattress counts as 2 items and a three piece suite (consisting of 1 settee and 2 chairs) counts as 3 items.

Before you contact us to book your bulky waste collection, have a good think about whether you have any other big items to dispose of. Once we have processed your booking, we are unable to make any alterations or add any other items – even if you have only booked one or two items.

BIFFA: WASTE COLLECTION DATES – APRIL 2024

OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

OCC Budget 2024-2025: The budget agreed by councillors for 2024-2025 includes above inflation rises for adult social care and children's services. Councillors also agreed an additional \pounds 5m capital (one-time) investment in roads and pavements and \pounds 1.2m revenue (ongoing) investment in potholes, drainage, and verges. All parties proposed budgets or amendments that included a 4.99% rise in council tax.

SOUTH OXFORDSHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL

District Council Meeting 22 February

The meeting **on 22nd February** was extremely positive, with the focus on setting the budget. At such a difficult time for councils across the UK, with so many at a financial crisis point, SODC's financial position remains positive and no reductions to services were considered. Since 2019 the progressive partnership administration has worked tirelessly to improve and then maintain the council's position through careful budgeting work and targeted investment in council operations. It was especially encouraging that the Community Hub (originally a Covid lockdown initiative) will continue to provide support, and there will be increased funding for homelessness prevention, as well as an expansion of the housing team. I spoke at council about the vital work carried out in homelessness prevention and the statistics to support this.

The budget also includes $\pounds 500,000$ to support community projects, such as to help improve residents' quality of life, to improve local facilities and increase action on climate change. $\pounds 60,000$ will be made available to support the arts across South Oxfordshire and $\pounds 405,000$ to improve the facilities at Cornerstone Arts Centre.

The council's capital budget includes significant planned investment in social housing and decarbonisation of leisure centres to reduce energy usage and ongoing costs.

The council tax for 2024/25 has been set at £146.24 for the year for a Band D property, meaning residents in South Oxfordshire will continue to pay one of the lowest rates in the country for services provided by a district council.

As well as setting and voting through the budget, council also marked two years of Russia's invasion of Ukraine by passing a motion to call on the Minister for Immigration to remove uncertainty around the ability for Ukrainians to remain in the country beyond the three-year temporary visas, many of which are due to expire in 2025. Council also resolved to continue to collaborate with Oxfordshire councils and statutory and voluntary sector partners in the development of a strategic approach for supporting people seeking sanctuary from any background. 2

Changes to Garden Waste Services in 2025

South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils have agreed the introduction of a permit scheme from April 2025 which will include a sticker for subscribers' bins to identify them as fully paid-up garden waste customers. This kind of scheme is offered successfully by many other local authorities, including in neighbouring West Oxfordshire.

When customers sign up and pay for the scheme in 2025, they will be sent a garden waste permit sticker to put on their bin(s), which will help the waste collection crews identify which bins should be emptied. The permits will act in a similar way to a parking permit as a proof of subscription payment. All subscribers will receive a new sticker annually each time they renew.

This will help to ensure that only households that have paid for the service have their brown garden waste bins emptied. The changes are part of the councils' ongoing work to improve the efficiency and value of public services.

The garden waste subscriptions currently run via annual direct debit payments from the date people signed up for the scheme. Next year, the councils will stop taking direct debit payments for the service. Customers will instead make a single annual payment by debit or credit card - so that everyone's payment year will be the same and will run from 1 April to 31 March each year. The council will directly contact all customers, via letters and email, in plenty of time to remind them to renew.

Benefits to customers include an all-new online system so they can manage their account and change their details much more easily. This will also mean the councils can contact people quickly if there are any disruptions to the service, such as during adverse weather.

Current subscribers will receive notification of the changes with this year's invoices.

Extra garden waste weeks

Got a brown bin? Planning a garden clear out to get ready for summer? Between 15 and 26 April you can put out extra garden waste on your normal brown bin day.

You'll be able to put out a maximum of up to four additional sacks of garden waste next to your brown bin. If you have more than one brown bin subscription, it's four additional sacks per subscription.

The extra waste must go in standard sized (60 litre) sacks and should only contain natural garden waste such as cut grass, plants or branches. It can be also go in boxes or containers totalling no more than a standard bin full.

Please do not leave out rubble or builders' waste bags as these won't be collected

RECTOR'S PINT

March ended, literally with Easter Sunday, it was the last day of the month, and the clocks went forward an hour. This may well have tested the mettle of anyone who went to a sunrise service on Easter morning. I know what I am like in the early morning!

The Sundays following Easter give us a glimpse into the mind-set of the early disciples and not least, Thomas, who we call 'doubting Thomas'. He is in fact my favourite disciple because he's the one who asks the awkward questions. I think that his doubts are to his credit; he wasn't going to believe in a story or a rumour without evidence. On the Sunday after Easter, his story, recorded in John's Gospel (Chapter 20) tells us that he refused to believe that Jesus had risen from the dead without evidence: "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe".

We read that Thomas had to wait a week for the evidence to present itself. We don't often get what we want when we want it! "Although the doors to the room they were in were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you". Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe". Thomas answered him," My Lord and my God".

I love that story, and that Thomas, who we accuse of being the doubting one, was, in fact, the first among the disciples to declare that Jesus was Lord and God.

Anyone who has ever been at a baptism that I have conducted, will know that I always tell the visitors and guests that I do what I do essentially because I believe this to be true, that Jesus was raised from the dead on the third day. I believe in the truth of resurrection from the dead because of Him. I have had plenty of times of doubt over the years, about how it all works in the face of the world's complexities and sorrows, but I can't get round this, that those who wrote these accounts down believed them to be true, and that conviction has stayed with me for many years now.

I rarely recommend films that try and tell us this story, but I am very happy to do so with *Risen* which stars Joseph Fiennes as the Roman Tribute who oversaw Jesus' crucifixion and who is then tasked with finding his body when rumours circulated that Jesus had been seen alive. It takes a different and unique view on the resurrection story. It can still be found on Netflix, and I think it is encouraging and uplifting.

Christ is risen.

FRIENDS OF WELLS FARM

As I write I am hopeful that April is going to be a warmer month with less rain than we have had for the last few months. We are fortunate to have rain where so many other countries are suffering from drought and water shortages, but I think Oxfordshire is now full! This month the extra sunshine accelerates vegetation growth and especially the grasses. Young bunnies will be about. You may even glimpse a young badger being taken out by the adults further from the sett or even playing on the path. Did you know that an adult badger can sprint at 40mph, nearly as fast as a horse! There are a couple of barn owls about, sometimes appearing in the barn and I suspect two squirrels have taken up residence in the old Black Poplar and have therefore kicked them out. I have noticed an increase in squirrel numbers over the last few years and suspect they are doing well in the milder recent winters. Birds are very busy nesting. Yellowhammers nest on the grown in rough grasses next to hedges. We have created a fair amount and the numbers have increased. It is especially important to keep your dogs out of this area from now until the end of July to ensure the chicks are not abandoned and grow to maturity. Skylarks tend to be further into the fields and you may have noticed that the 4 main arable fields have still not been planted up this year. Following the deaths of Paul and Guy Philips last year it is still unclear who will manage these fields and how. In the meantime, the fields are left fallow and it will be an interesting time to observe the changes in wildlife numbers.

If you walk around the reserve you will see a fair amount of work still being done. The overgrown hedge at the top of Blenheim Road has been cut back and laid. Just under half of the hedge along the bridle path at the far end has been laid. The rest will be done next winter. We have also been inspecting some of the newly planted hedgerows and replacing the useless cardboard plant guards with the more traditional plastic guards as the former have fallen apart and have actually rotted the plants. Fortunately the newer plastic guards are more easily recycled. Some of the fences have been repaired especially at the end of Long Meadow to prevent the Dexters from crashing through and falling into the brook!

This month work party jobs will include mending stiles, further maintenance of new hedges and any other jobs that might come along. Please feel free to reach out to me if you would like to know more about Wells Farm or would like to join me with one of the work party activities. Date for the next work party will be Saturday 13th April from 10am - 1pm.

The soil has been very soggy on top but it does dry out pretty quickly. Raspberries, Blackcurrants and Gooseberries all do well on the site. With a bit of attention and protection strawberries work well too. Potatoes are good especially Pink Fer Apples, Charlottes and Desiree. Beans can go in later this month. Plant one for you, one for the birds and one for the mice to make sure you have enough. Get your squashes going under cover (greenhouse) and with a bit of love they will do well for an autumn crop.

VIEW FROM VIEWS

There is an old saying that mentions "February Fill Dyke" certainly true this year, looking at my monthly rainfall records covering the last 10 years or so, we have exceeded our average of 50mm, by 100%, having recorded 101. This is interesting as it seems the February average can vary from4mm last year to 99.5 in 2020. Never known it as wet as at present, we can speculate as to the reason, Global Warming, but more likely the intensive development along the Thame valley. It is this over development that is causing not only this flooding but also the pollution of all water courses. If we are to stop this unacceptable situation, we must halt all development until proper mitigation action is taken. I have seen pictures of the chalk streams (the Test) in Hampshire, having sewage pumped into it this must stop, enough is enough, and to note the state of our flooded meadows when the floods recede, is beyond belief. Moreover I note that Southern Water have stated that they are to continue to extract water from these streams, during dry periods, probably until 2035 having agreed to 2027. These are just more examples of us human pressure on nature.

By the end of the first week of March, at last it looked as if we might soon be able to do some field work, first operation was to put on the first dose of fertiliser, which we did manage, now that could well be in the river. The next task will need to be attack weeds

which do not seem too bad, I guess due to the inclement weather, then of course disease will be the next problem just beginning to show. The condition of the crops is still presenting us with conundrums, we are still not sure what we should do with the Barley, much more of it looks as if it could produce a half decent crop, than it did this time last month. The Wheat is fine, if readers can remember one field we planted straight into a standing crop that had been killed the day before and, was still standing at 18" tall, this is a much better looking piece than the crop in the adjacent field planted on the same day. Now with more rain everything is back on hold.

Needless to say many water birds have benefitted from the floods, being constant visitors mostly gulls but, also Egrets. March is the month of the "Mad march Hare" luckily, I can report that the population of this wonderful creature is on a path to recovery. Grey/English Partridge continue to increase here, although they are thought of as a game bird and this many would think of little importance, nearly become extinct due to the introduction of the "Red legged/French Partridge" as they are more prolific therefore, better bet to introduce for game shooting. The "Greys", I am told are not so savvy as the "Reds" so need more nurturing, so it is somewhat of an achievement to be hosting them. The traditional Blackthorn Winter has seemed never ending, with it flowering over a much extended period this spring.

There is a debate around food security and, use of home-grown crops to produce green energy, this is an argument which is difficult to answer. How about years ago we used to grow oats to feed draught horses which gave us the power to plough, so what is different to now producing fuel from crops to power our tractors.

The PM recently attended the NFU annual conference, very rare for a PM to do this but, of course it is an election year. He did though make some very reassuring noises leading us to believe that he understood our problems, it remains to be seen what happens as we have heard it all before. Recent news on the subsidy schemes makes us believe that they are not only becoming more user friendly but also set at more realistic rates all very encouraging. Having said that there did not seem much for us in the budget. Not that anyone could expect much as the country is on its knees financially, as we cannot, repair the roads, support the NHS, or the Police, Railways are in disarray, and Education, all needing more investment, to mention just a few. The country has to recover financially somehow from being devastated by Covid and, now Ukraine.

Last month I mentioned the M & S building in London, where quite rightly Michael Gove said it should not be pulled down, for all sorts of very good reasons one being the waste of perfectly usable materials, but he has been overruled, by someone or system that has no regard for our valuable raw materials. Whilst on the political front, I understand that our previous district councillor is to stand as an MP for this constituency, all I can say that if she looks after us in the way she did as a councillor, then we will have an excellent MP.

Next Month sees us yet again partaking in the "Chiltern Vintage Tractor run", 19th May in aid of the "Air Ambulance", and this year we are fielding 4 tractors between us. Last year we collected £1782.50, which of course does not include those who donated to a communal "Just Giving" fund. John Howell MP writes

March 2024

Issues around the environment are never far away as there are so many important issues to pay attention to. As I write this month it's The Big Plastic Count. I'm joining lots of people across the country counting the single use plastic that I use this week. It will be interesting to see the data for this year to see how we are doing in moving away from single use plastics. It does take time to change our habits and indeed the manufacture of products. Since the introduction of the Resources and Waste Strategy for England in 2018 significant progress has been made to address plastic pollution, including a ban on microbeads and restricting the supply of plastic straws, plastic drink stirrers, plastic-stemmed cotton buds, plastic plates, trays, bowls, cutlery, balloon sticks and certain types of polystyrene cups and food containers.

Just as the need to reduce our plastic has become more widely known so too are concerns on the testing on animals of chemicals used as ingredients in cosmetics. The Government has recognised the public concern around this and has recently introduced measures to ensure that no new licences will be granted for animal testing of chemicals that are exclusively intended to be used as ingredients in cosmetics products. This is more good news.

Another concern raised with me recently is for our hedgerows which are an important part of our landscape. The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) is moving forward on several fronts on this. There are schemes to encourage farmers to maintain and restore existing hedgerows, while also planting more. Defra is also supporting farmers in assessing the condition of hedgerows, and to manage them in a way that will work for wildlife and improve biodiversity. However, it's not all about business. There are also plans in progress for domestic hedgerow regulations which will, among other things protect nesting birds in the season.

Another area which I know is of interest to constituents is the growing dependence on new technology and the risk of alienation that this can lead to for some people. We live in an increasingly online world and it is not going to change. This means that digital skills are important - from the basics that people need to make the most of online connectivity, to the skills needed in every job, to the high-level skills for the growing number of specialist jobs in the economy. The Government is committed to helping those who need support to acquire basic digital skills and is also working to remove barriers. This is all part of its broader strategy to reduce digital exclusion and very welcome.






